Global Leaders pledge US\$ 1.9 billion in Abu Dhabi to End Polio and protect children worldwide

ABU DHABI, UAE (8 December 2025) International leaders, philanthropists, and global health partners announced today in Abu Dhabi a collective US\$ 1.9 billion to advance polio eradication. This includes approximately \$1.2 billion in newly pledged funds that will reduce the remaining resource gap for the Global Polio Eradication Initiative's (GPEI) 2022-2029 Strategy to \$440 million. The funds will accelerate vital efforts to reach 370 million children each year with polio vaccines, alongside strengthening health systems in affected countries to protect children from other preventable diseases.

The global pledging event, 'Investing in Humanity: Uniting to End Polio', was hosted by the Mohamed bin Zayed Foundation for Humanity in partnership with GPEI, and took place at Abu Dhabi Finance Week.

The event was attended by His Highness Sheikh Hamdan bin Mohamed bin Zayed Al Nahyan, Vice Chairman of the Mohamed bin Zayed Foundation for Humanity; Ahsan Iqbal Chaudhary, Minister for Planning and Development, Pakistan; Bill Gates, Chair of the Gates Foundation; and Dr Tedros Adhanom Ghebreyesus, Director-General of the World Health Organization; alongside leaders from governments, multilateral institutions, and the private sector.

<u>Pledges</u> were made from a diverse group of donors and countries, including: \$1.2 billion from the Gates Foundation; \$140 million from the Mohamed bin Zayed Foundation for Humanity; \$450 million from Rotary International; \$100 million from Bloomberg Philanthropies; \$154 million from Pakistan and \$62 million from Germany; \$46 million from the United States of America; \$6 million from Japan; \$4 million from the Islamic Food & Nutrition Council of America (IFANCA); and \$3 million from Luxembourg......

Abu Dhabi Secure \$1.9 Billion To Finish The Fight Against Polio

- USD 1.9 billion in global commitments announced at ADFW 2025, including USD 1.2 billion in new funding
- Resource gap for GPEI 2022–2029 strategy drops to USD 440 million
- · Funding aims to reach 370 million children annually and strengthen national health systems

Roughly USD 1.2 billion of the total reflects new pledges, shrinking the outstanding financing gap to USD 440 million. The capital will accelerate immunisation campaigns aimed at 370 million children per year, with a parallel focus on health system resilience in regions where disease risk remains high.

Pledges spanned public, private and philanthropic funders. The Gates Foundation committed USD 1.2 billion. The Mohamed bin Zayed Foundation for Humanity pledged USD 140 million. Rotary International committed USD 450 million, Bloomberg Philanthropies USD 100 million, Pakistan USD 154 million and Germany USD 62 million. Additional support came from the United States at USD 46 million, Japan at USD 6 million, IFANCA at USD 4 million and Luxembourg at USD 3 million.

A Near-Eradicated Disease, But A Narrow Window

Wild poliovirus is now endemic in only Afghanistan and Pakistan, but variant strains continue to surface through low-immunisation corridors. The stakes are long term and financial. Full eradication would save the world more than USD 33 billion by 2100 compared with managing recurring outbreaks.

Funders commit \$1.9 billion to advance global polio eradication effort

The <u>Global Polio Eradication Initiative</u> (GPEI) has announced commitments totaling \$1.9 billion from a coalition of global health funders to close financial gaps and support the distribution of polio vaccines to more than 370 million children each year.

The pledges were made in Abu Dhabi at events hosted by the Mohamed bin Zayed Foundation for Humanity (MBZFH) in partnership with GPEI and include awards from the Gates Foundation (\$1.2 billion), MBZFH (\$140 million), Rotary International (\$450 million), Bloomberg Philanthropies (\$100 million), and Islamic Food & Nutrition Council of America (\$3 million). National contributors include Pakistan (\$154 million), Germany (\$62 million), the United States (\$46 million), Japan (\$6 million), and Luxembourg (\$3 million).

The funds will accelerate efforts to inoculate children globally with specific attention to programs in Pakistan and Afghanistan—the only countries where polio remains endemic—alongside strengthening health systems to protect children from other preventable diseases. With the latest commitments, GPEI's 2022-29 program remains underfunded by an estimated \$440 million.

"We are on the cusp of eradicating polio and securing a historic win for humanity," said <u>World Health Organization</u> directorgeneral Tedros Adhanom Ghebreyesus. "But we need all countries, partners, and donors to step up now to get the job done."

"We're 99.9 percent of the way there—but the last stretch demands the same determination that got us this far," said Gates Foundation chair <u>Bill Gates</u>. "The fight to end polio shows what is possible when the world invests together in a shared goal."

Abu Dhabi summit boosts Pakistan's push to end polio

Pakistan commits \$154m to strengthen nationwide vaccination campaigns

ABU DHABI: Pakistan has emerged as a central focus of a global polio funding drive after international donors pledged \$1.9 billion in Abu Dhabi to accelerate eradication efforts, with Pakistan remaining one of only two countries where the virus is still endemic.

Pakistan committed \$154 million to strengthen nationwide vaccination campaigns, surveillance and emergency response.

Pakistan's Planning Minister Ahsan Iqbal represented the country at the event, which was also attended by Bill Gates, World Health Organisation Director-General Dr Tedros Adhanom Ghebreyesus, and members of the UAE leadership, including Sheikh Hamdan bin Mohamed bin Zayed Al Nahyan and Sheikha Mariam bint Mohamed bin Zayed Al Nahyan.

Minister Ahsan Iqbal said the country was intensifying door-to-door immunisation drives, especially in high-risk districts of Khyber Pakhtunkhwa, Balochistan and Karachi.

Major international pledges included \$1.2 billion from the Gates Foundation, \$140 million from the Mohamed bin Zayed Foundation for Humanity, \$450 million from Rotary International, \$100 million from Bloomberg Philanthropies, \$62 million from Germany, \$46 million from the United States, \$6 million from Japan, \$4 million from the Islamic Food & Nutrition Council of America (IFANCA) and \$3 million from Luxembourg, along with contributions from other partner countries.....



Partners announce \$1.9 billion to advance polio eradication

Event held in partnership with the Mohamed bin Zayed Foundation for Humanity highlights urgency, honors leadership, and showcases champions advancing progress despite historic global funding cuts

ABU DHABI (December 8, 2025) – At Goalkeepers Abu Dhabi, leaders from government, philanthropy, business, and civil society issued a unified call to accelerate progress on child survival and infectious disease eradication. The appeal was anchored by US\$1.9 billion in commitments to advance polio eradication announced earlier in the day at Abu Dhabi Finance Week.

The Gates Foundation contributed US\$1.2 billion, reflecting its long-term commitment to a future where no mother, baby, or child dies from preventable causes, and where deadly infectious diseases like polio are eliminated forever.

Co-hosted by the Gates Foundation and the Mohamed bin Zayed Foundation for Humanity, Goalkeepers Abu Dhabi brought together more than 500 global leaders. The leaders delivered a clear message: the world must act now to reverse rising child deaths, stop preventable maternal deaths and finish the job of ending preventable diseases, starting with polio.



Global leaders commit \$1.9 billion to eradicate polio amid funding cuts

Dec 8 (Reuters) - Global leaders pledged \$1.9 billion to advance polio eradication on Monday, accelerating efforts to protect 370 million children from polio each year amid significant funding cuts.

The budget of the Global Polio Eradication Initiative, a partnership that includes the World Health Organization and the Gates Foundation, is expected to take a 30% cut in 2026 and has a funding gap of \$1.7 billion up to 2029.

The shortfall is largely due to a global pullback from foreign aid, led by the U.S., which is withdrawing from the WHO, although its future funding for polio is not yet final. Other wealthy donor governments like Germany and the UK have also made cuts.

The GPEI partners, in response, plan to focus more on surveillance and vaccination in areas with a high risk of polio transmission.

"The new support pledged in Abu Dhabi will be instrumental in helping the GPEI reach all children in the final endemic countries and stop variant polio outbreaks around the world." said Tedros Ghebreyesus, Director-General of the World Health Organization.
